To Whom It May Concern:

I examined a series of screening radiographic views of the above-mentioned horse. Radiographs showed an osteochondral fragment involving a palmar medial aspect of proximal P1 in the left front. No other significant findings were noted on the screening films at this time. Based on the location of the fragment, I feel the prognosis for ongoing racing soundness is good. These fragments develop in young weanling to yearlings. The prognosis for these is typically very good for soundness, and they do not usually show any evidence of effusion. Surgical removal can be performed if the horse shows any signs of lameness. If the horse is not showing any signs of lameness, I would recommend leaving the fragment alone at this time. These fragments are typically not a source of lameness and therefore I feel the prognosis is good for racing soundness.
